CHAIRMANS REPORT

Hi, everyone, 2017 has been a tremendous year for the SACGB and the sharking community in general. In my speech at this year's Annual Dinner and Trophy Presentation it was pleasing once again to be able to announce increased volume and size of sharks at all UK fisheries when compared to recent years. We are not clever enough to fully understand how nature works but undoubtedly the catch and release policy, government pressures around the world to reduce commercial sharking and the efforts to remove the abhorrent practise of finning are delivering results.

The increased level of interest in our sport is also a key factor in the numbers of larger sharks being caught and released as more lines in the water increase the chances of connecting with the bigger sharks.

There were many big sharks caught and released this year but among the most notable of these were John Dines Blue Shark (new record) from Bite Adventures, skippered by Robin Chapman. In August, Chris Bett brought a Thresher, estimated at 400lbs plus, to the side of The Midnight Rambler, skippered by Danny Vokins. The Celtic Deeps continued to deliver with a Blue from Andrew

Alsops White Waters which could have challenged John Dines fish had it not been foul hooked. We also had a number of other exceptional sharks which we sadly couldn't confirm due to lack of quality claim information. All in all, 2017 proved to be a very good year and I am sure you, like me, are very much looking forward to 2018.

Our Annual Dinner and Trophy Presentation in October was well attended with 64 members and guests meeting at the Portbyhan Hotel in Looe. Aside from the SACGB trophies I was also honoured to have the opportunity to formally present Andy Griffith and Chris Bett with their IGFA awards. Andy was recognised for catching a Shortfin Mako, Blue and Porbeagle on the same day and Chris for the catch and release of no fewer than 9 different species of shark. Both were given SACGB Certificates of Recognition to mark their achievements.

Due to holiday commitments and illness the Mitchell-Hedges Special Award Presentation had to be delayed until the 3rd December. Once again, we had a great turnout with 31 members and guests attending to congratulate John Dines and Robin Chapman with this once in a lifetime, and never to be repeated award.

A report on both these events are given in this newsletter.

The sharking communities interest in promoting conservation continues to grow with increasing numbers of anglers and skippers choosing to flatten barbs and release sharks at the side of the boat. Now we are connecting with larger fish we also need to revisit the welfare of the shark and the safety of the angler, skipper and boat if we are bringing larger sharks aboard. I recently looked at a photograph of Joyce Yallop's record Mako and it immediately becomes clear that a shark of this size could not be brought aboard, measured and

released. The club and the sharking community in general need to have a debate on how to recognise these larger sharks and others where an estimated measurement is all that's available.

The committee continue to work on repositioning the club to its former place as the Shark Angling Club of **Great Britain** and amongst other things are redeveloping our new website to reflect this. We hope to launch the new site early in the year.



The General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) come into place in May 2018 which, along with the Rule Book have consumed much of the committee's time this year. Although this work can be time consuming it's appropriate that we manage the club in a professional manner which protects both the club and its members, so this work is important. These two projects are now nearing completion

This year the club were pleased to welcome 39 new members. We also made an offer to all lapsed members to return on a reduced cost basis which resulted in 10 anglers re-joining the club.

Interest in the 2018 Festival has grown and as I write we have confirmed places for 41 anglers. To meet this increased demand, we need to use boats from outside of Looe. This has brought the committee a new but very welcome challenge. In addition to the much sought after winners badge, we have some other exciting additions planned for this year's festival which we will announce in the coming months.

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of three of our members last year. In October, Dave Snowden, better known to many as Snowy, passed on. Dave was a keen shark angler and could often be seen around the quay in West Looe waiting for the return of the shark boats, so he could catch up on events of the day.

In November, Tony Pimm, our club Vice President for many years also passed on. Tony was a long-standing member of the club and devoted a considerable amount of his time and energies to it. Many of you will recall purchasing shark traces from the club booking office. These were made by Tony. Over the years he built up an exceptional collection of Penn reels which may even be unique. We have certainly never heard of a private collection of Penn equipment like this. In his later years Tony could be seen chatting to the locals and having a smoke, or two, at Tasty Corner.

In December, Peter Maddock, our club President passed away. He and his wife Joyce celebrated their 70th wedding anniversary as well as 50 years of SACGB membership this year. Peter had a wealth of knowledge of the club's history and the sport. He was always willing to help the committee and in his last communication to the committee he was stressing the importance of being organised when measuring and releasing a shark so that it can be returned within two minutes of being boarded. He was also aware and fully supportive of the need for us to look beyond "biggest is best" in order to move our sport to the next level.

Peter, Tony and Snowy will be sadly missed but remembered fondly by all the members who knew them.

I hope you enjoy the January newsletter and I wish each one of you a great season and I look forward to seeing you all again this year and to following events on our website and Facebook pages as the year progresses.

See you at the Festival if not before.


2018 UK Fishery Report

The 2016/7 sharking season has been an exceptional one for anglers and skippers all around the UK.

The Welsh sharking hotspot of Milford Haven has produced over 1000 sharks for Andrew Alsop of

White Water Charters with Blues and Porbeagles of 200lbs plus being caught and released.

Nick O'Sullivan, skipper of Celtic Wildcat reports similar numbers to last year with a good number of fish around the 100lbs mark and one Blue of 214lbs.



Moving a lot further north to Scrabster in Scotland where the sharking season starts around September/October and extends into March, Chris Bennett reported 46 Porbeagles for the previous season. All were male fish with an average weight of around 200lbs. The best being estimated at 330lbs. Once again all were released. With Chris's season staring in October we are looking forward to hearing more from him in the coming months

Robin Chapman of Bite Adventures down in Penzance had a tremendous year with just under 1800 sharks caught and released with many of qualifying size up to 200lbs. Then of course there was John Dines Big Blue which set a new British Measured and Released Record also caught and released aboard Bite Adventures

Further round the coast to St Ives, Sam Narbett of Bluefin Charters brought a Porbeagle to the boat

with an estimated weight of 400lbs. The video is on Facebook and is worth watching. He also caught and released two Threshers last season which we only learned about this year

All skippers are reporting increased sightings of Tuna with many shark anglers losing a lot of line and end tackle to these "oversize mackerel".

We are sure there are many more similar events which the club are unaware of and we congratulate every one of you, be you a skipper or an angler.

Here in Looe, in common with many ports we lost a lot of days to bad weather this year. However, despite that we caught and released 1887 sharks which is an increase of 162 or almost 10% on the previous season. The number of qualifiers also increased to 89 which is a 15% increase on last season.

Finally, a special mention to Dan Margetts, skipper of the Sowenna of Looe who has successfully completed his first year. We also give our best wishes to Kieren Faisey who starts his sharking skipper career alongside his mentor Chippy in Easter this year. It's always a pleasure to welcome new skippers to the sport, so, on behalf of the club, welcome Kieren and Dan.

British Measured & Released Line Class Records

The move to the Measured & Released Record System brought us back to the start point with all records becoming available. This year saw Blue Shark 8lb, 12lb, 16lb, 20lb and 80lb line class records being claimed and confirmed. No claims were received from the ladies which was not due to a lack of sharks being caught by them, so we hope to see that change this year. We had no claims for Porbeagle, Thresher or Mako, although there were certainly Porbeagles and Threshers caught, measured, and released so there were opportunities.



To claim a line class record your shark must be measured, preferably recorded on video (good quality photographs are also suitable) and witnessed. The British Measured and Released Declaration form and details of the other information required can be downloaded from the SACGB website. The completed claim form along with the appropriate sample length of the line, the trace and the hook (full details available on the website) should be sent to the SACGB address for the attention of the secretary.

The claim details are checked and if the measurement/photographic/video evidence is satisfactory the line sample is then sent for testing. The line is subject to three breaking strain tests. To pass the test the line must break either on the limit or underneath each time, eg if its 20lb class line and it breaks at 20lb on test 1, then 20lb on test 2, then 19lb on test 3 it will pass. However, if it breaks above 20lb on any of the three tests the line will fail.

Many light tackle anglers purchase a higher quality line which has a greater chance of passing the test. Standard quality line will often fail at least one of the tests and break above its stated breaking strain.

If you are successful, your name and details of the record are published on the website. At the end of the season, unless the record has not changed since the previous year, the new 2018 line class record winners will receive a SACGB British Measured & Released Certificate and an engraved salver. With 11 vacant records for Blue Shark and 16 vacant

records each, for Thresher, Porbeagle and Mako there are lots of opportunities for you to keep our secretary busy this year.

NOTABLE FISH

Last year we got off to a late start with collating notable shark data. In fact, it was middle of the year before notable shark details began to be collected. We apologise for this and we also need to thank Ian Harbage for reminding us. A notable shark is one with an estimated weight of 100lbs or over.

Due to the late start we felt we were unable to award the SACGB Trophy for the member who catches and releases the most sharks with a minimum estimated weight of 100lbs during the season. Clearly, we would like to rectify this and be able to make the award at the Annual Dinner & Trophy Presentation on the 27th October 2018.



The website is now set up to enable details of these sharks to be published. If you have a photograph we are able to publish that as well. Please make sure the photographs are acceptable to publish with sharks being held correctly and clean.

The various fishery reports we received towards the end of the season all reported good numbers of

bigger sharks, so we are looking forward to this being a long list.

ANNUAL DINNER AND TROPHY PRESENTATION NIGHT



In spite of the widely forecast bad weather across the country, Looe woke up on the morning of what was our 64th SACGB Annual Dinner & Trophy Presentation evening, to bright sunshine although admittedly we had a bit of wind. The event was well attended with 64 members and guests arriving at the Portbyhan Hotel in Looe. Jeff Penhaligon, a retired Looe Harbourmaster, now working with the RNLI, and his wife Maggie were our special guests. Jeff very kindly presented the trophies. Unfortunately, our President, Peter Maddock and his wife Joyce were unable to attend but Peter passed on his warmest congratulations to all the winners and thanked the committee for their hard work.

I think it would be fair to say that we complied with "rule 2d" in the rule book as great time was had by all.

This year's event had a couple of differences as for the first time we awarded SACGB Certificates of Recognition and formally presented two IGFA awards. Due to holiday commitments and illness the Mitchell-Hedges Special Award presentation was unable to go ahead and was rescheduled to 3rd December.

18 trophies were presented, and we had confirmed claims for another 11. This means that excluding the monthly trophies there were a good number we had no claims for.

With the level of activity across the sharking community we are confident that many of those unclaimed, could have been claimed so our aim is to improve on these numbers this year.

Rule Book Changes



The new rule book has been checked for structure and is now being reviewed for content by the committee. Once this stage is complete it will be released on the website as a draft document for member comment. The planned completion date for all member comments is the 31st March 2018. We will then look to ratify the document at the AGM on the 12th July during the festival.

General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)

The GDPR comes into effect this year and all companies and organisations like the SACGB are required to conform to this new legislation no later than the 25th May 2018.

The SACGB's Privacy Notice will shortly be available on the website and it will provide the necessary information regarding how we collect and use your personal data in addition to explaining your rights.

The club have reviewed their procedures and are in the process of making the necessary administrative changes. The regulations require us to ensure that any member personal data we hold is accurate so we will be contacting you soon to help us confirm the details we hold for you are current.

Another requirement is that we have positive (Optin) confirmation of your contact preferences, eg are you comfortable with the club contacting you by email, post, telephone and text or only some of these.

You should know that we don't hold any member data which could be classified as sensitive.

To enable us to comply in this area we will be shortly be asking each of you to give your consent for us to use your contact details to continue to communicate with you. Please respond to this request as soon as you receive it as becoming compliant by the 25th May will draw heavily on the committee's administration time.

Obviously, the success of this exercise is dependent on the club holding correct contact details so if you know any members who have not received a communication by the end February can you/or they contact the secretary please.

If you are unsure of what to do when you receive the Opt-In request, please contact the secretary as soon as possible.

2018 Shark Angling Festival

Since last year's Festival, interest in the event has continued to grow. We currently have more confirmed anglers for this year's Festival than we have had for many years. We have also had two enquiries from skippers and their regular anglers from other ports regarding joining us.

Unfortunately, so far these have not worked out.



This has meant we are topping up the Looe fleet with vessels from other ports and we are pleased to announce that Pegasus, skippered by Lewis Hodder

and the Aquilla, skippered by Chris Gill will be joining us this year.

At this point in time we have a couple of spaces available and an associate member waiting list, so if any full member would like to take part, please contact the secretary <u>before the 31st March</u> after which any available spaces will also be made available to associate members.

The Festival format has been the same for many years and in response to a number of discussions which committee members have had with members we are going to change it a little.

We will continue with the current angler and skipper prizes from previous years which are,

First prize: the angler with the largest shark (in points)

Second prize: the angler with the second largest shark (in points)

Third prize: the angler with the third largest shark (in points)

Most sharks: the angler who catches the most sharks over the 3 days

Optional daily pool: The angler who catches the largest shark (in points) each day, and who has contributed to the pool, will take the money

Skipper of the boat with the largest shark

Skipper of the boat catching the most sharks over the 3 days

The additions will be confirmed in the next couple of months so watch your email in box for details.


At this point in time we have a number of entrants who have paid their deposit but not yet completed and returned their application forms. Can we have these by the end of January please.

What happens if we don't measure?

Shark angling and shark conservation has come a long way since 1993, when Danny Vokins sent a letter to one of my secretarial predecessors, Karan Sayer, asking her to present it to the Shark Angling Club of Great Britain Committee.

The letter was titled "Kill to Qualify Policy" and in it Danny expressed his view that bringing sharks ashore to weigh for membership purposes was no longer an acceptable thing to do.

As an alternative he proposed the use of a formula and witness system. At the time, not everyone shared Danny's view but ultimately his, and the views of many other anglers prevailed and today the formula and witness system are accepted by all and is the cornerstone of the conservation programme in our sport.



Within the sharking community the desire for shark conservation continues but so does the drive to improve on personal bests.

Some anglers are totally focussed specimen hunters whilst others, still hoping to catch and release a good shark also take considerable enjoyment from

the social aspect of the sport and from being away from their normal routine. But even the least committed specimen hunter harbours a desire to catch and release a big shark and improve on his or her personal best.

The club and the sport in general have a duty to support the desires of all its members/anglers, be they specimen hunters or otherwise.

My view is we need to learn to get our satisfaction and recognition not just from obtaining a record for the "biggest" shark but from other sources and achievements.

Let's assume the British Measured & Released Record for a particular species of shark is 200lbs and that this was confirmed by it being boarded, and the quality of the measurement evidence is 100% and beyond all dispute. Then one day, you get a shark to the side of the boat which is obviously considerably heavier than this shark. You manage to get some approximate measurements but because of concern for the welfare and safety of the shark, angler or boat, sea conditions etc, it does not allow you to obtain a 100% accurate set of measurements. However, many experienced skippers and anglers agree that the shark was around 300lbs and are on record as having said so. Recognise this situation?

Now put yourself in the position of the committee or organisation considering your claim. They too agree the shark was bigger than the current record and know the anglers and skippers involved to be honest individuals. However, what if the following week they get a similar claim for a shark which has been measured approximately three inches longer with an approximate girth measurement the same as yours. How would you feel if having been given the record you lose it to a set of approximate measurements?

My guess is that most anglers wouldn't feel too good about it.

If, however the angler made no record claim, as the measurements were not 100% verifiable, but took their satisfaction from the recognition and congratulations from those who were with him or her and perhaps also received some recognition from their club for it being a notable shark, in my view there is potential for everyone to be a winner.

Yes, this approach does mean that the record holder may well hold it with a smaller shark than one, or perhaps many which have been brought to the side of the boat and therefore, technically caught.

But let's be practical here, there is a point where it's not in the interest of the shark, the boat, the anglers or crew to push the boundaries just to get a verifiable set of measurements. The welfare of the shark and the safety of the anglers, skipper, crew and the integrity of the boat must always take priority.

Instead of some of our energies being lost through frustration when we cannot get record recognition let's put that energy to good use by working on ways to improve the measurement evidence or, better still, a recognition system that complements the "biggest is best" culture which we currently have.

We will always recognise the angler who is fortunate enough to catch the biggest, but we need to reconsider how we should recognise it. We should also ask ourselves is it only him or her we wish to recognise? Should we not also recognise equally, the skill and commitment of the angler who catches and releases the most specimen sized sharks, or the most different shark species, or the angler who beats their personal best or some other similar measure(s)?

We all know anglers we admire and perhaps even secretly aspire to be like, but they are not all record holders.

The preference of an increasing number of anglers and skippers today is to release sharks at the side of

the boat as it's the next obvious step in shark conservation best practise. It is also the obvious solution when the boat is too small or the shark too big for it to be brought aboard safely.

This behavioural change demands that we complement the "biggest is best" culture with recognition programmes for other successes and achievements.

What we must avoid however, is the situations where there is no, or very poor quality evidence. We must always strive to have the best possible evidence and with access to good photographic and video technology now being within the reach of most of us this is doable. Nobody is going to pat you on the back unless there is some very good quality evidence which they can review and satisfy themselves that the shark was as good as you, and those who were with you say it was.

There is much for the sharking community to think about and the solution will have as significant an impact as the change from weighing to the measurement and formula change did for the sport.

The SACGB are already discussing this at committee level and their decision will ultimately be taken on the majority of members views.

However, the sport belongs to the sharking community and is not owned by any club or group, so we are inviting the views of all from within the sharking community irrespective of whether they are members of the SACGB.

In general, the wider the consultation, the better the decision and level of agreement so we hope you will all contribute. Your views will remain anonymous unless you tell us otherwise.

All views, suggestions and input will be collated and published, anonymously, on the SACGB website, so we can all benefit from the discussion. As more views and suggestions become available this may change your initial thoughts, so let us know if your view changes as the debate develops.

2017 - an Exceptional Year

2017 is a year which skippers and anglers will long remember for many lost days at sea due to bad weather. The weather on the 21st October, when the Shark Angling Club of Great Britain held its Annual Dinner and Trophy Presentation was no exception with winds exceeding 50mph buffeting the port of Looe.



However, as every shark angler knows if you can't fish for shark the next best option is to talk about fishing for shark and that's exactly what those attending the event did, and lots of it. The evening reflected a tremendously successful Sharking year.



The Mitchell-Hedges trophy for the best shark of the season went to Chris Bett for a Thresher from Danny Vokins Midnight Rambler.



The Mickey Wonnall trophy (runner up to the Mitchell Hedges) and the Norman Lorraine trophy (best Blue Shark of the season) went to Dave Stone for a Blue from Robin Chapmans Bite Adventures.



The Sammy Porbeagle trophy for the best Porbeagle of the season went to John Crotty for a Porbeagle from Andy Trueloves Atlantic Blue.



The Sercombe Oliver Thresher trophy for the best Thresher of the season went to Chris Bett for a Thresher from Danny Vokins Midnight Rambler.



The Alan Caunter trophy for the best shark caught during the season by a lady member went to Angela Spearing for a Blue from Pete Davis's Force Ten

The club also recognised the IGFA achievements of two of its members. A Griffith was formally presented with his IGFA Shark Grand Slam for catching and releasing a



Mako, Blue and a Porbeagle in one day and Chris Bett was presented with his IGFA Shark Royal Slam for the catch and release of nine shark species. Both were presented with SACGB Certificates of Recognition.



The club launched the British Measured and Released Line Class awards this year and five have been awarded so far.

The SACGB have 37 angler's perpetual trophies plus a cup for the best fish of each month. All the trophy winners can be seen on the SACGB website.

After 62 years of waiting, on the 3rd December 2017 the SACGB presented the Mitchell-Hedges Special Award which was a challenge laid down by the clubs first President, Frank Albert Mitchell-Hedges.

Although Mitchell-Hedges is well known within shark angling circles, he is equally well known in other areas for being an adventurer, traveller and writer. One of his most widely known achievements is the crystal skull which he and his daughter allegedly found in a Mayan ruin in the 1920's.

Since his death and the death of his daughter scientists have shown the skull wasn't as old as they claimed so we think he was a bit of an Indiana Jones character who was well versed in the art of self-promotion.

Certainly, a character with whom most shark anglers could have enjoyed a pint, or perhaps two, with.

In 1953 he presented the club with the Mitchell Hedges Trophy which is awarded annually to the member catching and releasing the best shark of the season. The trophy was also used with the bank to secure a loan to start the club in 1953.

He also gave the club the Sammy Porbeagle Trophy which is awarded annually for the best Porbeagle caught and released by a member. The history behind that trophy is on the website.

It would be fair to conclude that from our perspective he was an all-round good guy who certainly had the clubs best interest at heart.

In 1955, 62 years ago, Mitchell-Hedges suggested a one-off challenge for the first Blue Shark of 250lbs or over. At the time the Blue Shark record was 130 lbs and was held by Mr Harry Whiddett so this was quite a challenge.

The winner of the challenge was to receive a personal trophy which Mitchell-Hedges provided, and the boatman concerned was to receive a Mitchell-Hedges cheque for £25.

This proposal was made on his behalf on the 15th October 1955 by R Roberts who gave the club the R C Roberts trophy for the heaviest qualifier of the season and seconded by J Holmes who gave the club the JJ Holmes trophy for best shark of the season by a member from Sussex. The proposal was carried.

Although the £25 cheque can be seen in the club accounts for a number of years it has long since gone.

The trophy was held by Pat Case until Mitchell Hedges death in June 1959. At that time there was a disagreement between the club and Anna Mitchell-Hedges and the trophy was never seen again by the club.

The challenge, or the Mitchell-Hedges Special Award as it became known remained and for 62 years anglers have had it in their sights.

Earlier this year, the SACGB were planning to repromote the Mitchell Hedges Special Award when news came in of John Dines Big Blue which was caught and released aboard Chippy's boat in Penzance. The video evidence received was examined by the committee and the dimensions confirmed. Using the formula Johns shark calculated weight came in at 256.5lbs and therefore became the British Measured and Released Record for Blue Shark. However, as well as achieving the record both John and Chippy had jointly won the Mitchell-Hedges Special Award.

Following in the spirit of Mitchell Hedges, the club have now laid down a new challenge which is for the catch and release of a 350lb or more, Blue Shark. The member who achieves this and the skipper involved will each be awarded a commemorative trophy.

This brings a list of new challenges for the sharking community to overcome. Do we bring sharks of that size aboard, and if not, how do we verify their weight etc.

Lots to think about but we are confident that the sharking community will come up with the correct answers to these questions and that the welfare of the shark will remain the highest priority.

On the 3rd December, sharking history was made as John Dines and Chippy were presented with the Mitchell-Hedges Special Award.

John received a personal trophy and a framed copy of the original minutes when the challenge was proposed and accepted.



Chippy also received a framed copy of the original minutes and £25 in notes from the period.



John was also presented with his certificate, confirming him as the current holder of the British Measured and Released Record for Blue Shark.



SACGB Chairman, Bob Woodman commented, "it's taken us 62 years to be able to present this award and we believe our President would be proud of John when he says, his proudest moment was watching the fish confidently swim back into the depths of the ocean. The sport has come a long way since Mitchell-Hedges laid down the challenge and is now totally focussed on shark conservation. The British Measured and Released Record system allows anglers to compete but more importantly it positions and confirms shark welfare and conservation as the shark angling community's number one priority".

We are aware that many of you have had and, sadly will continue to have similar experiences, where you have removed plastic, netting, long line hooks and other debris from sharks before releasing them. Increasing awareness of these situations is a good thing so we would be interested to hear from you where you come across situations like this.
