SHARK ANGLING CLUB OF GREAT BRITAIN

FINAL REPORT FOR 1958-54

At the end of the Club's year (16th October) there were 118 Members and many have accomplished amazing results during the Summer months.

Six hundred odd Blue Sharks were captured; 215 of these were over 40 lb. in weight; three Porbeagles and one Thresher. The complete list of Members' captures, at least those that were registered with the Hon. Secretary, is given at the end of this Report.

Club Rule Book.—The present Rule Book, it is felt, is inadequate, and the Committee are taking steps to produce a small leather folder in which a set of Rules may be inserted and reprinted from time to time as and when Rules are added or amended.

Many New Members have not yet been issued with a set of Rules, and the reason for that is because there was every possibility of further alterations being made at the Annual General Meeting. This, of course, did happen, and new books will be forthcoming in the near future for issue to all Members.

Lapel Badges.—Every Member should now be in possession of a Lapel Badge, but if any Member has been missed they should inform the Hon. Secretary.

Blazer Badges and Ties.—These are now available at 50/- and 25/- each, respectively.

Club Burgees.—Available at 35/- each.

Annual General Meeting.—This was held on October 16th and a good representative body of members attended.

Annual Dinner.—Sixty-three members and guests attended the Annual Dinner and were received by the President, Mr. F. A. Mitchell Hedges, and Miss le Guillon, at the Club's Headquarters in Looe.

A gay evening followed an excellent meal, and the Speeches, Presentation of Trophies and Prizes and the Entertainment provided were thoroughly enjoyed.

Loyal greetings to Her Majesty were sent from the Club and the following telegram was received from Buckingham Palace—"The Queen sincerely thanks the President, Chairman and Members of the Shark Angling Club of Great Britain, dining together this evening, for their loyal greetings and good wishes which Her Majesty much appreciates."

General.—In spite of the shockingly bad weather during the Summer months, members were not deterred from going to sea. The majority of the sharks were landed at Looe, and it was not always easy to obtain sufficient boats to accommodate the parties. There were, however, nine or ten operating, more or less specifically for Shark Angling and it is good news that there will be at least another four available next Season.

It is still a surprising fact that no commercial use has been found for the fish caught. No doubt members are not interested in the fish once they have had their sport and weighed their fish in, but what are the boatmen doing to supplement their hire charges? Perhaps someone will have a bright idea one day!

The amount of publicity given to the activities of members has again been nation-wide, stories having been printed in national newspapers, angling papers, Lilliput, Illustrated, and broadcast by the B.B.C., and for the opening of the North Hessary Tor T.V. Station a film of Devon and Cornwall has been made and a feature of the film is a "Shark Angling Trip."

The propositions made to increase the qualifying weight and to make an entrance fee of 5 Gns. for the first year, to include the 2 Gns. subscription, caused considerable interest amongst members. A good number voted by proxy and this gave a good line to those who were able to attend the Annual General Meeting. The increase in subscription being heavily defeated, but the proposition to increase the qualifying weight to 75 lbs. was carried after considerable discussion. Members were by no means unanimous on this point.

Classification of Gear

Some members may have read an article in an Angling Paper recently which referred to the "heavy" tackle being used within the Club, and may be wondering whether it would be possible to institute "classes" of tackle to be used by members. It, therefore, appears desirable that Members should be informed as to what has transpired in this connection and something of the problems involved.

The article under reference maintains that the tackle used for British sharks is too heavy and implies that it would be desirable to encourage the use of lighter tackle by the introduction of certain limitations in the conditions under which some of the Challenge Trophies are awarded.

Since the line is the weakest "link in the chain," it na rally follows that it is the line which must be considered when exploring the possibility of reducing the strength of tackle to be employed.

This has been considered by the Committee several times during the past year, and was also discussed at the Annual General Meeting in October. During that discussion it was pointed out that, whereas in the past, when only linen lines were used, it was possible to lay down classes of tackle because a linen "thread" had a breaking strain of 2lb. dry and 3lb. wet. This is not feasible now owing to the fact that many different makes of nylon and terylene (British and American) lines are in use, and because the strength of such lines is in many instances considerably greater than that claimed by their makers. It would obviously not be fair to limit the strength of lines when certain makes might be very much stronger than the "strength" figure laid down, although according to the makers they might be of the specified strength.

Until a solution of this problem is forthcoming no further

move appears to be justified.

At the General Meeting members who attended were asked to send to the Committee any suggestions they might have to make and it is hoped that all members of the Club will think about this difficult problem, and should they have any helpful ideas send them to the Honorary Secretary for the Committee.

The suggestion that one make of line should be specified is not practicable since it would be establishing a "monopoly" and

lead to considerable extra expense for members.

Trophy for June

A "TATLER V" Reel, manufactured by Messrs. Grice & Young, has been presented by that firm to the Club for Competition during June, 1955. It will be awarded for the Best Blue Shark landed during that month.

British Record Blue Shark

Mr. J. V. Barlow, on leave in this country from the Sudan, landed a Blue Shark of 155 lb., easily breaking the existing record of 122 lb. He landed the fish at Looe and it was his first shark in this country. As he was not a member at the time of capture he did not, of course, qualify for the Club's major trophies but won the "R. C. Roberts" Trophy for the best qualifying fish. He also wins the Anglers' News "Fish of the Year" Trophy, presented by Mr. Mitchell-Hedges. In the Qualifying Competition Major G. Roberts' Blue Shark of 120½ lb. was second.

Reporting Captures

It is again stressed that in order to keep Club Records and Statis, as members should notify the Hon. Secretary of ALL fish caught, regardless of weight. Of course, those of over 75 lb. must be carefully entered on the Declaration Forms and duly witnessed, but in the event of a member having fish of under 40 lb. the addition, for example, of "and four smaller" may be added beneath the details of the "Notable Fish."
