SHARK ANGLING CLUB OF GREAT BRITAIN

FINAL REPORT FOR 1956-57

It is pleasing to note that the steady increase in the membership has continued during the 1957 season.

The actual number of new members enrolled was 175, against 49 lapses.

Observations as to the possibility of this increase being maintained during the coming season are made later in this report.

The total number of sharks landed during the season was 4,172 of which number 451 were registered as qualifiers. A large number of further fish of qualifying weight are believed to have been caught, and it is intended that in future an attempt will be made to record all fish of qualifying weight.

Mrs. Eathorne's 271 lb Porbeagle (a potential World record) and Mr. Simpson's 161½ lb Blue are the outstanding catches.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

This was held on the 18th October, 1957 at the Guildhall, Looe, and was well attended.

The following proposals were dealt with:-

- No. 1. That there be a Midland Social Section as per Agenda distributed to all members.—Carried by a 58 majority.
- No. 2. Amendment. That there will be an entrance fee of £3 . 3 . 0, and that the annual subscription be reduced to £1 . 1 . 0.—Carried by a 29 majority.
- No. 3. That there will be a reduced subscription of 10/6 (Family Membership) for all subsequent members of one family who reside at the same address.—Carried by a 45 majority.
- No. 4. That members must renew their second year's subscription before being eligible to wear the Club's badges, etc. (other than the lapel badge). Carried by a 36 majority.

The implications of resolutions 2 and 3 are dealt with in a later stage of this report, and in the light of coming events it may well be necessary to bring them under review at the next Annual General Meeting.

ANNUAL DINNER

102 members and guests sat down to an excellent dinner at the Nailzee Point Hotel. A most enjoyable evening ensued, and all the "sharks" had a whale of a time. No horizontal champions were observed on this occasion but as the writer of this report ceased to take any clear observations after 2 a.m. this statement cannot be vouched.

GENERAL

(With particular reference to resolutions 2 and 3)

Members will, of course, realise that the effect of the above mentioned resolutions, will be to reduce the Club's annual subscription income. Subscriptions at £2.2.0 per member for the year 1956/57 brought in £703 (352 members).

For the year 1957/58 it would be unwise to count on a total of more than £400 from annual subscriptions, in view of the following facts:—

- (a) The reduction of the annual subscription from £2.2.0 to £1.1.0.
- (b) The reduction of the £1 . 1 . 0; to 10/6 for family members. This might affect the subscriptions of 50 members.
- (c) While the entrance fee of £3 . 3 . 0 will to some extent off-set the reduced income by reason of (a) and (b) above, it is possible that fewer members will join during the year, and it is also possible that the annual wastage rate—which is always considerable owing to members leaving the Club after paying their first subscription—will not be more than balanced by the addition of new members.

It is impossible to forecast with any degree of accuracy what the position will be at the end of next season, but it would seem that economies will have to be effected.

An examination of the Club's annual payments for 1956/57 indicates that payments for 1957/58, if incurred at the 1956/57 rate, are likely to approximate £417, arrived at as follows:—

The Foregoing has considerable significance at the present moment because of the following:—

Shortly before the Annual General Meeting, but after the voting papers in respect of propositions and amendments thereto had been sent to members, the Looe Sailing Club again approached certain members of the Committee in connection with a possible arrangement whereby members of our Club would be given facilities at the Sailing Club in return for certain financial considerations.

Our Committee, as such, did not take part in the discussion, but in view of the fact that many members had expressed—during the shark angling season—the hope that premises might be acquired, or made available where members could foregather, it was ready seriously to consider any reasonable proposal, the financial conditions of which would come within the realms of possibility.

Now that the income for 1957/58 is unlikely to be more than is required to meet the expenditure, it is obvious that the question of premises, or facilities at another Club, must be left in abeyance. Had the subscription remained at £2 . 2 . 0, it is possible that the Committee might have been able to come to some arrangement by which the cost of these facilities could have been met out of income—such arrangement would, of course, have been submitted for approval, or otherwise, to members at an Extraordinary General Meeting.

In view of the foregoing, and in order that the matter may be left open, our Secretary has communicated with the Looe Sailing Club in the following terms:—

"Consideration has been given to the terms of your offer of certain

facilities to our members.

I am now directed by my Committee to inform you that, much as the offer is appreciated, and the facilities desired, financial considerations preclude, at this stage, their acceptance.

Members of this Club at their recent Annual General Meeting carried certain resolutions which will seriously reduce income during the coming year, and my Committee feels that to enter into any negotiations likely to increase expenditure at this stage would be unwise.

The matter will be raised at the next Annual General Meeting, and if the financial position of the Club then allows, my Committee would welcome an opportunity to discuss the matter further with you."

RESIGNATION OF MR. PAT CASE

Members will be sorry to hear that our Hon. Sec. / Treasurer for the past two years, Mr. D. P. Case has resigned. The Committee in accepting his resignation placed on record its appreciation of the hard work he has carried out for the Club. It is only right to say that our Hon. Auditor, in a letter to the Chairman after the annual audit, stated that Mr. Case is to be congratulated on the way he has dealt with a great number of detailed transactions.

At their Meeting on the 23rd November, the Committee elected Brigadier J. A. L. Caunter to be Chairman for the ensuing year.

"The Chairman and Committee wish all members of the Club a pleasant Christmas and another excellent Year of Sport in 1958."

APPOINTMENT OF NEW HON. SEC. / TREASURER

Capt. Thomas Clark, of West Hill Cottage, West Looe (Telephone Looe 130) has now been appointed to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Case.

Capt. Clark, formally an accountant with the London County Council, is now living in retirement in Looe, and has been an enthusiastic member of the Club since 1955.

BANKERS ORDERS

Members who pay their subscription by Bankers order, are advised to inform their Bank of the relevant new rate payable—i.e. £1.1.0 for the first member of a family, and 10/6 for each subsequent member. (A member of a family is understood to be a person of that family residing at the same address as the first member).

HON. CORRESPONDENTS

The Committee would welcome reports on shark angling from places other than Looe, and therefore asks for Members in such places as Penzance/Newlyn, Falmouth, Newquay, Fowey, Mevagissey, Plymouth and Salcombe to act as Hon. Correspondents. Should more than one name be received from any one Port, the Committee will decide whose name shall be accepted.

Although a number of additional boats plied from Looe during the current season, the general cry is for boats and yet more boats, and and members would be well advised to book as far ahead as possible, with a deposit, in order to avoid disappointment.
