CHAIRPERSONS WELCOME

Welcome to the first Newsletter of 2022!

A Happy New Year to you all!

2021 was a good year for sharks with 1231 sharks caught. Whilst this is slightly less than the previous year when 1311 were caught the number of qualifiers increased significantly from 86 to 144. I believe the total number would have been greater had it not been for the algae bloom through most of September, which had always been a good month. The number of porbeagles was well down on the previous year, 2 compared with 18. There were 2 threshers caught one on the Swallow skippered by Murray Collings and one on the Bee Cool skippered by Paul Woodman, it's always good to see these.

Notable fish for the year were 2 huge Porbeagles one of 450lbs estimated weight caught by Mike Wallace and one of 550lbs estimated weight caught by Simon Davidson. Both these superb fish were caught on the Reel Deal skippered by Dan Hawkins. Dan has had a fantastic season, amongst his

catches were 4 Threshers in 5 days and 23 Porbeagles in 2 days.

2 blues of note were caught, one was released at the side of the boat estimated at 200lbs, caught by Nick Simpson on the Sowenna skippered by Dan Margetts and one was boated and measured 198lbs caught by Chris Evans on the Typhoon, skippered by Phil Curtis.

We saw the arrival of Blue Fin Tuna in our waters last year with two of our local boats, Swallow and Sowenna licensed to catch, tag and release these magnificent fish. Boats from other ports have also been licensed to target them and have enjoyed great success with many being caught, tagged and released.

2021's Festival was a great success with more participants than in previous years. As we had to secure boats from other ports.

The club is in a very healthy position both financially and membership we now have 396 members and our Lucky Run Club has 16 members with someone winning £80 each month.

During the last year the Committee have formed links with other interested parties namely the Angling Trust. Shark Trust, etc.

It just remains for me to thank the Committee for attending meetings and in particular Claire Kelly for all the work she does in what has been a difficult year for everyone.

I hope to catch up with many of you at the Festival!

British Measured and Released Record – Steve Chivers

For the current season - don't forget, you have to submit a Claim form to be considered for a Trophy and provide photographic or video evidence, within 4 weeks of the catch.

Final Claims MUST be received by midnight on 30th September 2022. (except for claims for the Iris Memorial Trophy which is 8th October cut off) Claim forms can be downloaded/filled in on our website.

The Chairman read the following speech at the Presentation Evening:

Dan has had a fantastic season, amongst his catches were 4 Threshers in 5 days and 23 Porbeagles in 2 days. 2 Blues of note were caught, one was released at the side of the boat, estimated at 200lb, caught by Nick Simpson on the Sowenna skippered by Dan Margetts and one of 198lb was boated and measured by Chris Evans on the Typhoon, skippered by Phil Curtis.

This year, again, we have seen the arrival of Bluefin Tuna in our waters. Two of our local boats, Swallow and Sowenna have been licenced to catch, tag and release these magnificent fish. Boats from other ports have also been licenced to target them and have enjoyed great success.

This year's Festival was a great success with more participants than in previous years. As we had to secure boats from other ports, spaces will be limited for the coming year.

The club is in a very healthy position both financially and membership wise, with 396 members.

During the last year the Committee have formed links with other interested parties such as the Angling Trust and Shark Trust etc.

It now just remains for me to thank the Committee and in particular Claire Kelly, and in the background – her husband Alan, for all the time and effort they have given in the last year, and I am sure that you will join me in thanking the Hannafore Point for the superb meal that we have had tonight.

2022 SHARK FESTIVAL

The dates have been set for the 2022 Shark Festival. They are the 29th, 30th June & 1st July with the draw evening taking place on the 28th June.

At time of going to print the festival is full with 47 anglers and 12 boats booked.

Please note that final payment for the festival is due on, or before, end February 2022.

The Festival format will be the same as usual with winners being decided on points score except for the most sharks prize.

First prize: the angler with the largest shark (points score)

Second prize: the angler with the second largest shark (points score)

Third prize: the angler with the third largest shark (points score)

Most sharks: the angler who catches the most sharks over the 3 days

Most cumulative points: the angler with the most cumulative points over the three days

Optional daily pool: The angler who catches the largest shark (in points score) each day, and who has contributed to the pool, will take the money

Skipper of the boat with the largest shark (points score)

Skipper of the boat catching the most sharks over the 3 days

The entry fee for the 2022 Festival remains at £450 per person. There is currently a waiting list in place for spaces to the Festival.

A note from Danny Vokins regarding Porbeagles:

Hi Danny Vokins here,

Well, this maybe the last time I and a lot of dedicated shark anglers will be able to fish for Porbeagle if the Shark Trust get their way and get the Porbeagle onto the Schedule 5 of the Wildlife and Country Act.

If it gets through then fishing for them is out of the question with an unlimited fine & 6 months prison sentence, as for all of the angling clubs that fish for them, they will also be at risk. The main reason for this proposal is that they say the Porbeagle is sought after for their meat and finning and sport. They also say this is resulting in a crash of numbers making the Porbeagle critically endangered and on the IUCN red list of threatened species in 2006. I would like to see some sort of evidence of finning and Porbeagle meat going to market in the UK. As for sport fishing providing anglers keep to the SACGB best practice codes and respect the fish they catch, you only have to look at the Bluefin tuna programme to see what a success this was.

I personally keep my boat running when we have a shark on, we all know if you stop a shark swimming then you have a problem on your hands: a fish doing itself damage. We have records going back 40 plus years which tell me that the Porbeagle has made a remarkable recovery over the last 6 years with good numbers coming from all ports around the country that fish for them. It seems to me they are using outdated data on this matter and to say they are endangered (seriously at a risk of extinction) which is completely ludicrous. We have been tagging sharks for last 30 years that includes Thresher Blue and Porbeagle and have obtained a great deal of knowledge on all of these species. From 1996 to 2006 we fished the Hurd Deep mainly for Blue shark where we caught hundreds and tagged & released for the National Marine Fisheries Service for their studies on migration routes and fish growth. Just one tagged fish caught from the Hurds on the 29/07/04 which was recaptured on the 20/03/05, 681 miles NE Cayenne French Guiana, travelling 3170 miles.

As for the Porbeagle we know that tagged fish have been recaptured in the North Biscay in winter months and return to the IOW waters in the spring early summer. This is just two examples from our database that we have required from tag and release, if we do not have the right to fish for this species then where are the marine biologist and scientists going to get their info from?

If this goes through, the next step will be the Thresher and Blue.

Then its game over.

Update on JNCC Review of Porbeagle and Common Blue Skate

The JNCC is reviewing Schedule 5 of the Wildlife and Countryside Act. During the evidence-gathering stage of this process, a proposal(s) was made to add further protections for both porbeagle shark and common blue skate.

The proposal is currently under stakeholder consultation, which closes on Sunday, 30th January 2022. Evidence submitted as part of this consultation will be considered and included within a series of final recommendations by the JNCC regarding the addition, retention, regrading or removal of species.

These recommendations will then be delivered to respective Ministers in England and Wales, who will decide whether they should be enshrined in law.

The Angling Trust has formed a sub-group with its <u>Marine Advisory Group</u> to respond to the consultation. It has been decided that the Trust will only respond regarding porbeagle as common blue skate are not commonly encountered by anglers in England and Wales. Through the response, the socio-economic

value of the fishery will be highlighted, alongside the scientific value anglers bring to the table and the great work that has been done to improve angler awareness of best-practice behaviour. We will be fighting for the future of fishing, and the fish anglers care so much about it.

Shark Hub UK – an independent organisation of which the Angling Trust is a member – will also be submitting a response drawing attention to the current science and the vital role anglers play in gathering that data.

The sad reality is that if this proposal were successful, much of the crucial science to further understanding this species would be impossible. It seems nonsensical that in the interests of conservation and science, the primary source of data to further those efforts would be prohibited from collecting that data.

Anglers and charter skippers may also respond to the consultation if they wish, and we will be releasing advice this week on how best to do this. The Angling Trust wants to extend its thanks to all anglers and charter skippers who have been supportive of its work on sharks over the last twelve months – without you; it would not be possible.

Nevin Hunter, Marine Regions Coordinator, said, "Anglers are committed conservationist's, and these are species that can be best researched by us working closely with scientists catching and releasing them. As anglers, we enjoy catching such wonderful species, but we are part of the solution to their long-term survival, not the problem and can achieve this by working with scientists such as those within the Shark Hub'.

Dr. Simon Thomas, Shark Hub, said, "Although well-meaning, this proposal will offer no additional protection to porbeagle and risks undermining the research that anglers and scientists are working together on to understand better the species, which both ICCAT and ICES have recognised as being vital to for their protection. Measures which may work in terrestrial environments don't have the desired effect in the hidden world of our oceans."
